


The Summit will be held at the David Braley Health Sciences Centre located at 100 Main Street West on Saturday, October 24, 2015.

Hui received hers for founding the Hack- cult times," according to its website. ney Laces Community Club in London, a girls-only soccer (football) club. A vital part of Hui's Canadian upbringing, she Lindsay Fitzgerald, Hamilton Spectator, July 5, 2015 says, was the 10 years she spent with the Hamilton Youth Soccer Club. When she moved to the U.K. to complete a master's degree at the London School of Economics in 2007, she was shocked to find that there were no opportunities for women to play soccer in London. "It blew my mind that they didn't have it," said Hui. "Here, there are no opportunities for women to play and I think we're spoiled in Canada by it." Hui runs Hackney Laces on a volunteer basis with other women. She works as a manager of corporate responsibility and sustainability for Sainsbury's, the country's largest supermarket chain. Since its opening in 2011, Hackney Laces has grown into a team of 30 volunteers, supporting 200 girls, and also has a partnership with a second club using the same model. The club also has a mentorship component, where girls can gain help with job applications and placements.
