February 2021 President's Report



With the weather being so winter-like, I wanted to find something I could do inside that would be interesting and educational. Being Black History Month, learning more about Black history in Canada made sense. In particular, I have been focusing on the accomplishments of Black women in our country.

Most people know about **Viola Desmond**, owner of a beauty shop and school in Halifax, who is on our \$10 bill. In 1946, Viola challenged racial segregation at a cinema in New Glasgow, Nova Scotia by refusing to leave a whites-only area of Roseland Theatre. Her crime? Tax evasion for the one-cent tax difference between the seat she had paid for and the seat she used. But what about some of the other women who have contributed to the history of Canada?

Like **Carrie Best**, who broke the story of Desmond in the first edition of *The Clarion*, the first black-owned and published Nova Scotia paper.

Or Mary Ann Shadd. She was the first Black woman to publish a newspaper

in North America when she established the Provincial Freeman. She was also a teacher, who established a racially integrated school for Black children in Windsor.

Then there is **Pearleen (Borden) Oliver** (1917-2008). She was a religious and human rights leader, writer, historian and community activist in Nova Scotia for over sixty years. As an activist, she fought to remove discriminatory barriers that restricted education and employment opportunities for Blacks and other minorities in the 1940s and 1950s.

And **Kathleen "Kay" Livingstone** of London, Ontario. Kay worked to break down prejudice and promote equality of individuals of all origins and contributed to the development of a more tolerant society. She was the driving force behind the first National Black Women's Congress (1973), providing a national forum to address the concerns of Black women and advance their causes.

Yolande James is a former Quebec provincial politician. She was the first Black female Member of the National Assembly of Quebec (MNA), and the youngest, as well as the first Black cabinet minister in Quebec history.

Barbara Howard was born and raised in Vancouver. During the late 1930s, she was one of the fastest female sprinters in the British Empire. She represented Canada at the 1938 British Empire Games in Sydney, Australia. Howard later graduated from UBC in 1959 attaining a B.Ed. and was the first member of a visible minority hired by the Vancouver School Board.

And then there is **Senator Anne Clare Cools**. She was a social worker in innovative social services in Toronto. A pioneer in addressing domestic and family violence, in 1974 Cools founded one of Canada's first women's shelters, Women in Transition Inc., and was its Executive Director.

And the list goes on. Women who fought the odds of discrimination on the basis of gender AND race. They made a difference and forged a path for others to follow. We owe them, and so many others, our thanks.

In their stories, and contributions, I personally find inspiration for our mission as Zonta members – to empower women through service and advocacy. We have a lot to contribute ourselves by paving and smoothing the path for women today, and in the future.

From Our Archives

As a continuation from last month, more of our club's history.

In 1950, Hamilton began building a new Art Gallery in Westdale (near McMaster University). Our club donated to the building fund. We presented the Gallery with an oil painting that was painted by one of our charter members who was an Artist – Hortense Gordon. Hortense was an abstract expressionist with many of her paintings in art galleries throughout Canada.





In 1952, the City of Hamilton was in need of a convalescent hospital which was named the Nora Frances Henderson Hospital. Nora Frances Henderson was also a charter member of our club. She was the first woman elected to Hamilton's City Council and a journalist and editor with the Hamilton Herald Newspaper. Our club furnished a four-bed room in the hospital.

In 1953, Hamilton opened one of the first school for "retarded" children in Ontario. Our club furnished a craft room.

Throughout the 1950's our club contributed financially to cultural aspects of Hamilton through music scholarships. We established a scholarship at McMaster University for a female student who had the highest marks at the end of their first year and who intended to enter business economics or social studies in their second year. This was established in memory of our club's first President – Jean B. McBride – who was a Certified Public Accountant. Our club purchased eighteen Brownie and twelve Girl Guide uniforms for Eskimo (Inuit) patients at the Tuberculosis Sanitorium on the Mountain.

In 1956, our Club began their long-term involvement with the Citizenship Court. Each new Canadian was presented with a brochure about Canada. The brochure was designed and developed by Agnes Hay who was another charter member of our club. The brochure contained information about Canada – government, population, area, political parties and laws of the country. It also included information about Zonta International. In 30 years, our club greeted over 5,400 new Canadians.

There have been interesting programs over the years. In 1934, Thekla Hall spoke. Her Father was an Explorer and a friend of Cecil Rhodes who made and drew the first map of Rhodesia. In 1937 our club worked with the St. Catharines club to celebrate Zonta International. Gifts were sent from 77 different Zonta Clubs in America, Europe and Hawaii. The gifts were auctioned off. The head table had dolls dressed as young women of the country from which the gift had been sent. The walls were hung with pictures and posters depicting activities and classifications of all our members at the time. At the 10th Birthday Celebration, members were presented with a piece of tin which is the traditional 10th anniversary gift. The wife of the Shakespearian President spoke at a meeting and brought costumes that the actors wore.


